

#### Project MO.R.E. Mission Statement <u>More Opportunities Relevant Education</u> <u>More and Options for Renewing Education</u>

Project M.O.R.E. is an Alternative Education High School in Tucson Unified School District #1. Project M.O.R.E. is an acronym that stands for More Opportunities for Relevant Education, or Models and Options for Renewing Education. For students, it represents an alternative to the larger, regimented, traditional schools. The curriculum and course requirements are the same as for all T.U.S.D. High Schools, however, Project M.O.R.E. students are expected to assume more responsibility for determining how their academic program is designed. Students work closely with their Advisors, and other academic teachers, in small teacher to student ratios.

Project M.O.R.E.'s student body is composed of students from all nine of the T.U.S.D. High Schools, as well as some students from other schools outside of District #1. We support and encourage a wide diversity of student enrollment, creating an interesting and talented cross-section of Tucson's population.

Project M.O.R.E.'s mission is to provide a supportive community where students develop academic mastery, generosity, independence, accountability and a sense of belonging. Special programs include some individualized instruction, Rock School Music Production and Recording Program, Computer-Assisted Instruction, FutureBuilding Program, Woodshop, T.Y.P. (Talented Young People) Magazine and Yearbook Production, and Art and Photography Creation and Exhibition Opportunities.



#### A Message from the Principal, Robert Mackay

First, I want to thank Kathryn and her T.Y.P. (Talented Young People) MAGAZINE and YEARBOOK Block Class students for creating our T.Y.P Magazines, and this YEAR-BOOK. It is an awesome responsibility, which requires a lot of dedication and hard work. You guys did a wonderful job, and the results are great.

This has been a great year at Project M.O.R.E., both in student academics and student activities. other Block teachers & students participated in this year!
















# GAIL'S BLOCK CLASS, focuses on Human Relations (special projects) & American Government. Take a look at this SUGAR experiment!

#### What's in our food anyways?

In a society where counting calories, fat, and carbs has become second nature, Gail's block class decided to take a peek at what's in the every-day food (and we use the term lightly), teens consume around Project M.O.R.E. For a couple of weeks, the students purchased, consumed and then saved the containers from chips, sodas, water, tea, cookies, candy bars, gum, candy pieces, crackers, and sports drinks.

Using the labels from these products, the students calculated the number of grams of SUGAR in each serving. It was a surprise to find that most packaging was for more than one

serving and meant multiplying by 2 or 2.5 to get the true sugar content. Next, the students calculated the number of teaspoons of sugar per product (4 grams of sugar = 1 teaspoon of sugar).


At that point the numbers were surprisingly large – some with 30 teaspoons of sugar!! To complete the study, a visual was added. The product package was attached to construction paper and then the sugar was measured into cupcake liners to illustrate exactly how much sugar was being consumed while eating the product. Sodas were no surprise, with two cupcake liners of sugar (augh, per can)... but a big surprise was the Arizona Tea with a big mound of sugar sitting next to the can. Chips were surprisingly low in sugar, but high in carbs – which is another study for another day.

Impact? Students from other classes were invited to visit the display in Room 120 over a few days and view for themselves the amount of sugar in these products. The "NO WAY" award went to the Jolly Rancher package of candy with three cupcake liners of sugar just waiting for you. Any wonder that students are dozing off by 4th period before they get a balanced lunch? Think you are drinking or eating something healthy? Think again. Not only do you need to check the sugar content, but how many servings are in that container... and multiply it to get the true sugar content. We know most students dislike reading, but in this case, reading could save you from a life as a diabetic, and at the very least... save you a pound or two.

















KRIS' BLOCK CLASS, "What's Up, Documentary?" focuses on viewing and analyzing films, from political documentaries to hilarious "mockumentaries." We learn about theme, camera shots, iconography, lighting, balance, and editing. We also focus a great deal on the craft of writing; specifically, how do you write a successful film analysis that provides insight and revelation? Well, take the class and you'll find out...






#### JOHN C.'S SCIENCE BLOCK CLASS

provides the opportunity for students to earn two quarter credits in nine weeks, in either Physical Science or Chemistry. In order to prepare for the AIMS Math Exam, the first weeks of class will focus on mathematical topics common to all scientific disciplines. The remainder of the quarter focuses on topics normally covered during second semester of Chemistry, including laboratory techniques used forensic scientists: Crime Scene Investigation. Written work includes standard lab reports for which word processing instruction is provided.
























#### JOHN K.'S RAZA STUDIES AND P.E. BLOCK






#### TAMMY & BRISA'S BLOCK CLASS, "STUDENT








#### Take Back
