- 1. What was your favorite thing about this year?

- 4. Do you think the staff of Project M.O.R.E did a good job this year? Yeah! They did a great job in a number of different ways. More importantly, they did a good job at working with the students academically, and helping them emotionally.
- 5. Do you think Project M.O.R.E. is improving academically? Absolutely yes! We still have a way to go, Yes we have the best math department and that's the area where students struggle the most. I'm proud to have the great math teachers we have.
- 6. How is Project M.O.R.E. different from all the other schools in TUSD? Project M.O.R.E. is different because students and staff have a different relationship. Here at Project M.O.R.E. we have structure along with an attempt to create an adult relationship between staff and students that generates respect.
- We've heard many school's are closing down. Can Project M.O.R.E. be one of them?
   No, not as long as I'm' around. You would have to get rid of me first.
- 8. How has this school year been unique from all the others?
  Every year is unique; that's why this is the best job in the world. It keeps me young.

Project M.O.R.E.'s mission is to provide a supportive environment, where students develop academic mastery, generosity, independence, accountability and a sense of belonging. Special programs include some individualized instruction, Rock School Music Production and Recording Program, Computer Assisted Instruction, FutureBuilder Program, T.Y.P. (Talented Young People) Magazine and Yearbook Production, and Art and Photography Creation and Exhibition Opportunities, Mural creation, and M.O.R.E.

I've been going to Project MORE for about two years now and I plan to graduate this May. One thing I've noticed during my time here is that many students come here to finish up their high school credits, but don't plan to go to college afterwards. Getting your high school diploma is a great goal, but don't stop there! You can have even more opportunities if you continue your education past high school. Unless you have a sure career lined up for you after high school (like a family business) college is something you need to seriously consider.

#### Where do I go from here?

You have a few options for post-high school education. You can either go straight to university or go to a community college after high school. The good thing about going straight to university is possibly getting your degree done faster, but it takes more money than community college and you have to have certain required classes done to get in. For example, to get in to the University of Arizona, you have to have taken these classes:

4 years of English

- 2 years of a foreign language
- 4 years of math
- 2 years of social studies
- 1 year of fine arts
- 3 years of laboratory science

I, for one, will not have these requirements done by the time I finish high school, so I'm going to go to Pima Community College instead, at least at first. To get into Pima, all you have to do is fill out an application and take a placement exam. You can fill out an application online at <a href="http://www.pima.edu">http://www.pima.edu</a>.

#### How do I pay for it?

There are many options to help you get through school. Here are some resources you can use so you don't have to pay for college on your own:

Fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at http://www.fafsa.ed.gov. The deadline to turn this in for the 2008 school year is June 30th, 2008.

Apply for scholarships. You can find hundreds of them on <a href="http://www.fastweb.com">http://www.fastweb.com</a>, with all different sorts of qualifications.

Most of us can fall back on our parents if needed, especially if we're moving out and they won't have to feed us anymore. Maybe they can be willing to help pay for school.

For other options, you can talk to Leigh or a Pima College advisor at any location for free.

This year ldy Linares took over for much of the spring semester, while Kathryn was out on medical leave. ldy did a wonderful job, and is an awesome teacher.



Denise and Joseph: The instructors of meditation here at Project M.O.R.E

Transcendental meditation is a technique which is taught to new practitioners in a standardized, seven-step procedure, comprised of two introductory lectures, a personal interview, and a two-hour instruction session given on each of four consecutive days. Instruction begins with a short puja ceremony performed by the teacher, after which the student receives a mantra, learns the technique, and begins practicing. Subsequent sessions provide further clarification of correct practice, as well as more information about the technique.




### **Rock School**




## Muralistas
